SCC Holds Successful Open Active Tournament

21 players showed up at the SCC premises on Sat., April 24, for a one section swiss, with section prizes. Here is the report on the winners from Maurice Smith, SCC Vice – President:

"We made a prize fund consisting of Open - first, second and third. Under 1800-first and second. Under 1600 - first and second. The problem was that there were five players with three points that were in the top two sections.

So anyway, it was broken down like this. Imtiaz Husain was clear first overall. Bryan Lamb was clear second overall. The under 1600 was won by Sadiq Juma, Kevin Xiang was second.

Then the five who shared third place overall and best under 1800 were Andrew Picana, Nikola Brajkovic, Mann Ki Le, Pepin Manalo and Pino Verde. They each received \$36. Imtiaz received \$100, Bryan received \$40, Sadiq received \$70, Kevin received \$40. "

The SCC is now located in the Canadian Legion Hall, Branch # 42. SCC was most fortunate to have the Ladies Auxiliary of the Legion support our tournament with refreshments. Maurice wrote :

"The Ladies Auxiliary was extremely helpful. When I arrived at 9.00 a.m. there was already a pot of coffee waiting for us along with a plate of cookies At 12.00 they came up with plates of egg salad, salmon and ham sandwiches along with mustard and pickles. One of the ladies also brought up a pot of tea. Unfortunately there were not enough players to do justice to all of this. In the end the ladies partitioned off the left over sandwiches and cellophane wrapped them in order that they could be taken home. They

looked after us extremely well. On Monday I called the Manager Susan James and advised her how appreciative we were of the ladies help.

I thought it was a very relaxing fun tournament."

FIDE April Rating List

There is still only one player over 2800 : # 1 : Garry Kasparov (Russia), 13th FIDE World Champion - 2817 (down 14 pts. from the January list).

There are now only 15 players in the 2700's (down from 17). But the big surprise this list is that Viswanathan Anand (India), 2000 FIDE World Champion, has now moved up into second place, with a rating of 2774, ahead of now #3, Vladimir Kramnik (Russia), 2000 BrainGamesNetwork World Champion, who has 2764. Back up at #4 (from #10) is Peter Leko (Hungary), the challenger to Kramnik in their semifinal Prague Unity match later this year, with 2741; at #5 is Veselin Topalov (Bulgaria) with 2737; at #9 is Judit Polgar (Hungary), the strongest women's player in the world, with 2728; at #10 is Ruslan Ponomariov (Russia), 2002 FIDE World Champion, at 2722.

12th FIDE World Champion, Anatoly Karpov (Russia) is # 22 – 2682; 1999 FIDE World Champion, Alexander Khalifman (Russia) is now down to # 32 – 2668.

Here are a number of the younger players we're watching: Alexander Grischuk (Russia) is #11 – 2719; Etienne Bacrot (France) is #27 (up from #32) – 2675; Teimour Radjabov (Azerbaijan) is #31 (up from #35) – 2670; Francisco Vallejo Pons (Spain) is #35 – 2666.

The two highest Canadians with FIDE ratings are: GM Kevin Spraggett, former Canadian Champion, at 2564; GM Alexandre Le Siege, 2001 Canadian Champion, at 2497.

World Championship - Prague Unity Agreement

Moammar Al Qaddafi has now clarified that Israeli players will be granted entry visas to come to Libya to play in this year's FIDE knockout championship, and so the tournament does not have to be played in 2 different simultaneous locations.

Also, the sponsor of the Kramnik – Leko side of the draw, which is to be played Sept. 25 – Oct. 18, Swiss tobacco manufacturer's Dannemann, has announced the location of the match – Brissago, Switzerland.

Laszlo (Leslie) Witt

International Master 1969 Canadian Open Champion 1962 with perfect score 9/9 Quebec Open Champion 1962, 1963, 1965, 1967 Represented Canada at Olympiads (1964, 1966, 1970) Played Canadian Championship 1963, 1969, 1972

These days you'll more likely find IM Witt playing backgammon than chess. Here's a battle, recorded in the tournament book edited by Ron F. Rodgers, from the 1962 Canadian Open Championship which Witt won by accomplishing the rare feat of a perfect score.
