Unrated – 1st/2nd were Fred Lai and Roman Zavarikin with 3 pts...





SCC Starts New Autumn Swiss

After being closed for the summer for July and August, SCC will restart its tournament calendar tonight, Thursday, September 15, at 7:00 p.m. with a new one-section 6 round swiss. Time control is Game/90. You can take out a year or part year membership. Come out and play some friendly, but competitive, CFC – rated tournament chess.

Also, last Thursday, Sept. 8, SCC held its 2005-2006 Annual General Meeting. Elected officers for the new year are :

Two major decisions were made concerning the coming year. One dealt with the SCC Club Championship. It was decided to continue having it in 2 sections, the Championship section being a round-robin, entry being by rating, and the Reserves Section being a swiss. In order to play in the club championship, you must have at least a 6 month club membership. Also, the 2nd and 3rd place finishers in last year's Reserve Section will qualify to play in this year's Championship Section.

The second major decision dealt with the GTCL's Club Team League . The GTCL is starting this year an U 2000 League. SCC has decided that it will enter a team this year in the new league.

How Children Develop Logic Skills with Chess

(This is Pt. II of a 4-part article, How Children Develop Skills with Chess, submitted by David Cohen)

Critical thinking skills can be developed from chess in the field of **logic**, with applications to reading, writing, research, and learning.

The development of these skills is due to the forced alternation of moves by the two players of the game. To have any success in a chess game, a child must learn to reason as follows:

"If I do this (move 1), then my opponent will do that (move 2)"; and

"If I do this (move choice 1), then it will be a better result for me than if I do that (move choice 2)".

Analysis

List, then assess, the strengths and weaknesses of both the player's position and the opponent's position. Use observation, with reference to standards learned from books or other players. Use imagination to develop possible actions (alternatives).

Evaluation

Assess the value of an action, taking into account possible responses by the opponent.

Judgement

Compare alternative actions and determine which is best.

Planning

Form a plan for an action. Set the goal, then break the plan down into achievable steps to reach the final goal.
