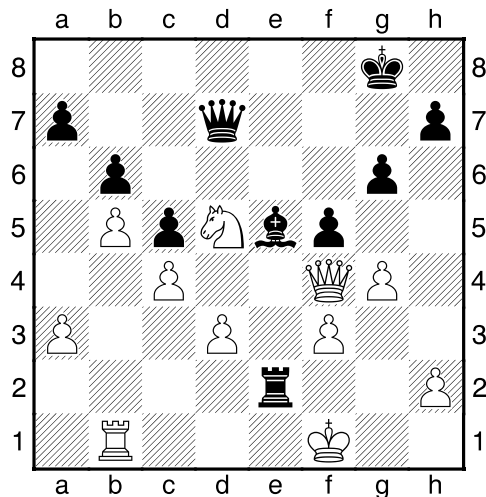

This 8-player round robin was played July 29 – August 6. It had an average rating of 2720 (FIDE Category 19), and included 2000 Classical World Champion Vladimir Kramnik (Russia). It was won by Kramnik, on tie-break, ahead of equal first place finisher, Peter Svidler (Russia), both of whom had 4.5/7 pts. Here are the final standings :
